We too can understand his question, because at times we seem to be caught between the a rock and the hard place. Through no fault of our own, we find ourselves in some difficulty and we ask where are you Jesus or like John we would like to send messengers

Jesus sends to John this reply: 'Go back and tell John what you hear and see, the blind see again, and the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, and the deaf hear, and the dead are raised to life and the Good News is proclaimed to the poor; and happy is the man who does not lose faith in me'.

to ask are you the Messiah? Would you help me or would I have to go to someone else,

This is Jesus' message to us as well. Despite the difficulties we might be facing, we are called to look around and see the presence of God. A former parishioner of mine who was suffering from a form of cancer, wrote to me to say that she and her best friend had attended a weekend retreat, where the priest leading the retreat laying hands on her and prayed. She went on to say that she felt as though a current had gone through her, she and her friend returned home, next day she visited the doctor who took another X-Ray, a few days later he rang her to say she is cured no trace of the cancer. I have heard many cases such as this! Where priests have prayed over someone who have found themselves cured.

When we hear of such events it should give us courage, remember that last line: 'happy the man who does not lose faith in me'. When we are going through difficulties we can be consumed by it and cannot see the light and like John caught between the rock and the hard place. We are called to pray and not lose our faith in Jesus, to pray, hope and don't worry. Continue to pray and it will be answered somehow, somewhere, even if not how we expected. Keep trusting in God. He will answer and he will not let us down.

When late Cardinal Hume, visited St Therese's cell in Carmen in Lisieux he says, by the door of her cell, scratched into the wood, she had written, 'Jesus is my only love'

That was not written in exaltation but in despair. She was crying out to her Beloved that even when she experienced nothing but absence, emptiness, darkness, she clung to the assurance of being loved and carried in his arms. That is the faith at a heroic level-that is trust, clinging to God when everything in our experience would seem to contradict his very existence, or at least his love for us.

The following was found written on a cellar wall in Cologne after World War II:


I believe in the sun even when it is not shining

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The Immaculate Conception

From the Church tradition: the Immaculate Conception is a dogma originating form sound Christian Tradition. Monks in Palestinian monasteries started celebrating the feast of the Conception of Our Lady by the end of the 7th century. The feast spread as the Feast of the Immaculate Conception in Italy in the 9th century, in England 11th century, and in France 12th century. Pope Leo VI propagated the celebration, and Pope Sixtus IV approved it as a Feast. In 1854, Pope Pius IX declared the Immaculate Conception to be a dogma of Faith. In 1858 Mary Appearing to Bernadette in Lourdes, said, 'I am the Immaculate Conception'

In Sacred Scripture: we read, God purified prophet Jeremiah in the womb of his mother (Jer1:5' Before I formed you in the womb of your mother I knew you and before you were born, I consecrated you'). And God anointed John the Baptist with the Holy Spirit before John's birth as John's mother attests, (Lk 1:43-44' how does this happen to me, that the mother of my Lord should come to me? For at the moment the sound of your greeting reached my ears, the infant in my womb leaped for joy'. It is reasonable that God kept the mother of His Son free from all sin from the first moment of her origin.

The angel saluted Mary as 'full of grace'. The greeting means that Mary was never, even for a moment, a slave of sin and the devil. In Gen 3:15-'l will put enmity between you and the woman and between your seed and hers; He will strike at your head while you strike at His heal'. 'The woman' stands for Mary and the promise would not be true if Mary had original sin.

If we are allowed to select our mother, we would select the most beautiful, healthy and saintly lady.. God cannot be born from a woman who was a slave of the devil, even for a moment in her life


