Assisted Suicide

Dear Friends.

The House of Commons Health and Social Care Committee has launched an inquiry into assisted suicide and is inviting individual members of the public and interested organisations to comment, an to suggest what actions might be helpful for the debated. Suggested Options a 'Citizens Assembly', further research, or a referendum.

Assisted suicide presents profound dangers to public safety and the common good, and it's imperative as many of you as possible engage with the Parliamentary Inquiry and oppose the introduction of assisted suicide into UK law. It's equally important that those of you who respond should oppose the idea of a 'Citizens' Assembly or referendum on this issue, since these could be abused to legalise assisted suicide.

Pope Francis has taught against assisted suicide, euphemistically called, 'assisted dying', as have previous pontiffs.

'All life has inestimable value even the weakest and most vulnerable, the sick, the old, the unborn and the poor, are masterpieces of God's creation, made in his own image, destined to live forever, and deserving of the utmost reverence and respect' (*Pope Francis*, *Message to Catholics participating in Day for Life in Britain and Ireland, July 28 2013*) 'Physician assisted suicide is part of a 'throwaway culture' that offers a 'false compassion' and treats a human person as problem.., Ture compassion does not marginalise anyone, nor does it humiliate and exclude-much less considers the death of a person as a good thing' (*Pope Francis, Address to Directors of the Orders of Physicians of Spain and Latin America, June 2016*)

'More and more lonely elderly people exist in big cities, even in situations of serious illness and close to death. In such situations, the pressure of euthanasia is felt, especially when a utilitarian vision of the person creeps in. In this regard, I take this opportunity to reaffirm once again the firm and constant ethical condemnation of every form of direct euthanasia, in accordance with the Church's centuries-old teaching' (*Pope Benedict XVI*, *February 25 2008*)

'As believers, how can we fail to see that abortion, euthanasia and assisted suicide are a terrible rejection of God's gift of life and love? And as believers, how can we fail to feel the duty to surround the sick and those in distress with the warmth of our affection and the support that will help them always to embrace life?' (St. Pope John Paul II)

The Catholic Church is clear that we can never assist in taking the life of another, even if they request it. All life is sacred from conception until natural death, and we reiterate our call for investment in high quality palliative care. Our call is one for assistance in living and not assistance in committing suicide. (*Statements of the Bishops*)

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Baptised into the Holy Spirit

When a Church is consecrated to God it's set apart for him alone. Great art works are used in it's construction; and after it's magnificently ornamented it's offered to God, to be his forever. Scriptures tell us that we are temples of the Holy Spirit St Paul reminds us: Didn't you realise that you were God's temple and that the Spirit of God was living among you.?

On the day of our baptism we were consecrated to be temples of the Holy Spirit. Before the regenerating water is poured, the catechumen is freed from the empire of Satan and made to renounce satanic works, Then, when his will is confirmed in consecration to God, he is baptised, and the Holy Spirit takes possession of his temple.

We as Christians are the temples of the Holy Spirit; we are consecrated to him. Nothing else may be done in that temple in which God dwells except that which gives glory to him. St Paul has stated that even the most mundane of actions of the Christian should be done to this end: Whatever you eat, whatever you drink, whatever you do at all, do it for the glory of God. Isn't this the ratification of the baptismal offering, the renewal of the promises made at the time, the free and loving acceptance of the life that God infused in our souls when the Church received us into her maternal bosom? True devotion to the Holy Spirit is not something distinct from the Christian life-It is the life thoroughly understood, seriously practised, and deeply enjoyed. To be devotee of the Holy Spirit is to comprehend the august dignity of the Christian-the holy mission and arduous duties that are sweetened by love. It is to establish ourselves in the truth, to be faithful to the sacred promises of baptism, to be what we ought to be, and then strive for that perfection to which we all as Christian should aspire...,

True devotion to the Holy Spirit, therefore, is not something superficial and intermittent, but something profound and constant, like the Christian life itself. It is the love of the soul that corresponds to the love of God, the gift of the creature who strives to be grateful for the divine Gift, our human cooperation that receives the loving and efficacious action of God. As divine love is eternal and its action constant, it's our part to have our heart always open to love, ready to receive the unspeakable gift.

'Look, there is the lamb of God'

In our Gospel, John says, 'he who sent me to baptise with water said to me, 'The man on whom you see the Spirit come down and rest is the one who is going to baptise with the Holy Spirit' Those such as the Pharisees listening to John did not recognise Jesus as the Messiah, so John tells them, 'Look there is the lamb of God that takes away the sin of the world'.

This Jesus whom we couldn't pick out form the crowd, was the lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world and to whom we could understand the Father speaking the words we read in our First reading, 'You are my servant Israel, in whom I shall be glorified'

When Jesus comes he doesn't throw his weight around so we might miss his coming if we were expecting great things. I think Jesus comes in a similar way today, as a humble lamb. One of the documents of the II Vatican Counsel says, Jesus comes in the word of God in the readings, in the Eucharist, in the congregation and in the priest (Sacrosanctum Concilium 7).

When the readings are proclaimed God is speaking to us. If a line from the text strikes you, we normally understand this as God speaking to us.

In Holy Communion, Jesus comes to us in the fullness of his body, blood, soul and divinity.

Jesus is present in the congregation because where two or three are gathered in his name he is present in our midst.

Jesus is present in the priest who offers Jesus to the Father jus as Jesus offered himself to the Father on the cross.

Jesus comes to us in four ways when we gather here for our Sunday ass in the word of God, in the Eucharist, in the congregation and in the priest.

In which one of these four ways would we find it difficult to see Jesus present Is it in the Word of God in the readings because they are from a culture so different to ours; in Holy communion because Jesus still looks like bread after the consecration because we know the faults and weaknesses of some people present; or in the priest because we wonder about his sincerity and because we can see his faults and weaknesses?

When Jesus comes now in these four ways, in a certain sense, you would not pick him out and he has to be pointed out. This how I would point out te presence of God in these four ways.

It requires faith to believe that, after the consecration, the bread is no longer bread but Jesus although still looking like bread. Jesus is present and the Eucharistic miracles confirm this on -many occasions when the bread or wine physically changed at the consecration to also look like flesh and blood.

If we find difficult to love someone in the congregation this of Jesus

He had no form or charm to attract us

No beauty to win our hearts;

He was despised the lowest of men (Isa 53:2).

If we find it difficult to see Jesus in the priest, perhaps what we read in the letter to the Hebrews about Jesus the High Priest might help:

Since all children shared the same human nature, it was essential that Jesus too shared in it.., It was essential that Jesus should in this way be made completely like his brothers so that he could become a compassionate and trustworthy high priest (Heb 2: 14-17).
