 it may not be treated with contempt: and this for the benefit not of God but of men. When we say, 'Thy kingdom come,' which will certainly come whether we wish it or not, we arouse our desire for that kingdom, that it may come for us, and that we may be worthy to reign therein. When we say, 'Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven,' we are asking him for obedience for ourselves, that his will may be done in us as it is done in heaven by his angels. When we say, 'Give us this day our daily bread, we mean by 'today' this present time. You will find nothing that is not contained in the Lord's prayer

He who says, for example, 'As you have been glorified in us, so be glorified in all nations', and, 'Let your prophets be found faithful', what is he saying other than, 'Hallowed be thy name'?

He who says, 'Restore us, O God of hosts; let your face shine, that we may be saved,' what is he saying other than, 'Thy kingdom come'?

He who says, 'Direct my ways according to your word and let no iniquity master me', what is he saying other than, 'Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven'?

He who says, 'Give me neither poverty nor riches', what is he saying other than, 'Give us this day our daily bread'?

He who says, 'Remember O Lord, in David's favour all the hardships he endured', or 'Lord, if I have done thus, if there is wickedness in my hands; if I have given back evil for evil,' what is he saying other than, 'Forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us'?

He who says, 'Rescue me from my enemies, O God, and deliver me from those who rise up against me', what is he saying other than, 'Deliver us from evil'?

And if you run through all the words of the sacred prayers, you will find nothing, in my opinion, that is not contained in that Lord's prayer. Hence there is freedom to use one form of words or another while praying, yet still saying the same things; but there should be no freedom to say different things.

We may pray this way for ourselves, for our own people, for strangers, and for our very enemies, without hesitation; though according to the nearness or distance of relationships different emotions will arise in the heart of the one who prays.

There you have, I think, not only the manner of your prayer, but also what you should pray for; not from my teaching, but from his who deigned to teach us all.

The blessed life should be sought, and requested from God. The nature of blessedness has been much discussed by many people; but why should we go to many people and much explanations? In the scripture of God it is put briefly and truly: 'Blessed is the people whose God is the Lord' In order that we may be of that people, and attain to contemplation of him, and everlasting life with him, 'The of the commandment is charity from a pure heart, and good conscience and unfeigned faith.

In the same trinity, hope is put in place of good conscience. Faith, then, and hope and charity lead to God the man who prays, the man, that is, who believes, hopes and desires, and gives heed to what he is requesting from the Lord in the Lord's prayer.

SPECIAL PRAYERS FOR THOSE WHO HAVE DIED

It is a tradition in the Church that November should be a time when we pray particularly for the souls of the faithful departed.

One of the ways we pray for the dead is to prepare a list of all the people special to us who have died and put that list in to the parish, asking everyone to pray for them. The result is that we are all praying for each other's dead friends and relatives.

If you wish to put forward a list of people you would like the community to pray for, write out the list (using, if you wish, the special lavender coloured paper provided) and put it in one of the Holy Souls envelopes you will find in the lobby of the church. If you wish to make an offering, put the money also in the envelope; this money will be used to fund Mass intentions for Holy Souls during the coming year. Either hand the envelope to me, or to our Sacristans, or into the collection basket at Mass.

From the 1st November we will put a special basket in front of the Altar.

Saying Goodbye, (part of the Mariposa Trust) are coming to London in November with a very special Baby loss remembrance and support service (part of a UK and Ireland chain of events).

The Mariposa Trust's core objective is to support people who have lost babies at any stage of pregnancy, at birth, or in infancy. It was founded in 2012, by Zoe and Andy Clark-Coates, who saw a critical lack of support for people like them, who had gone through baby loss. With over 258,000 babies being lost yearly in the UK alone, the charity needed to be able to offer not only a comprehensive package of befriending and support but also national baby loss remembrance services (called Saying Goodbye Services), for people to join together and remember the children they had lost. 5 years on, over 150 services have taken place at Cathedrals and Minsters across the UK, US, and France, and 2023 will see 21 services across England, Wales, Scotland and Ireland.

On the 26th November at 3.30pm in Central Hall, Westminster, we will be hosting one of our Saying Goodbye Services and as this is the most local service to you this year we wanted to share this information with you. So who is the service for?

Anyone who has either personally lost a baby at any stage of pregnancy, at birth, or in early years, or who has been affected by family members' or friends' loss. Whether the loss was recent or 80 years ago, everyone is welcome to attend. We have also extended the services, and gladly welcome anyone who is grieving the fact that they haven't had children. This may be due to circumstance, infertility, or for other reasons - but all are welcome. Babies and children are also invited to come with their families, as the Saying Goodbye service is truly a family event for all.
