The bee sucks the honey from the flowers without injuring them, leaving them as whole and fresh as when it found them. Devotions goes further, not only is it unharmful to any state of life, it adorns and beautifies it. Precious stones of all kinds when steeped in honey become more brilliant thereby, each one according to its colour, so every one becomes more lovable and more perfect in his vocation if he combines it with devotion.

It makes the care of family peaceful, the love of husband and wife more sincere, the service of one's king more faithful, and every task more pleasant and a joy.

It is not only erroneous, but a heresy, to hold that life in the army, the workshop, the court, or the home is incompatible with devotion. Purely contemplative, monastic or religious devotion cannot be practised in these callings; yet, these are not the only kinds of devotion; there are many others suitable for those who live in the world and capable of leading them to perfection.

Wherever we find ourselves we not only may, but should seek perfection.

In response to the Cardinal's letter. I announce the second collection this weekend to help people in Gaza.

The collection will be by cash only; unfortunately you cannot donate by card. A message from the Cardinal about Gaza and the West Bank

Dear Father,

You will recall that some time before Christmas – on 14 November, to be precise – I invited you to hold a collection after Christmas in response to the appeal from the Latin Patriarch in Jerusalem for support especially for those in Gaza. I thank all who have been able to respond to this request.

In the last few days I have heard directly, via Zoom, from the Parish Priest of the Church of the Holy Family in Gaza City and from the CEO of the Latin Patriarchate. The situation they face is grave and most demanding. We were told that there are still 600 people sheltering and being cared for in the parish compound, together with over 50 seriously disabled and vulnerable children. Water and food can be bought in the local markets at much inflated prices. With the damage inflicted on this site some time ago now, cooking hot meals is only possible three times a week. The parish is also providing for 200 people in the Orthodox property as well as for local Muslim neighbours.

The situation in the West Bank is also grave with more than 100,000 families losing income because of various factors, as well as the absence of all visitors and pilgrims.

The Patriarchate is able to provide assistance. It can make funding directly available to the parish leadership and is providing food etc to many in the West Bank.

I invite you to consider if a further contribution to the work of the Latin Patriarch might be forthcoming from your parish. If you do make such an appeal, please use my name in doing so, if you wish to do so.

Our Finance Office is ready to facilitate the speedy transfer to the Patriarchate of any such donations along with funds from collections already taken. They will provide further information by separate e-mail on how and when funds will be collected.

I am very aware of other ways in which this support can be offered to the victims of this conflict including Friends of the Holy Land and CAFOD. But I hope we can respond to this direct appeal from the Latin Patriarch and the work which he is able to effect.

BAPTISMS

Parents who wish to have their child baptised, are advised to come to see me first and make no plans until after they have completed the Baptism Course. They need to make an appointment by contacting Katherine at the office on millwall@rcdow.org.uk. Once I recognize them as practising Catholics, they need to buy a baptismal pack (£10/casj). The next step would be to complete the baptism course that we run every other month.

The date of baptism can be booked with Katherine (Parish Office) but it has to be confirmed in writing. It's a requirement of Cannon Law (Church Law) that each child must have godparents; one has to be male and the other female.

A godparent is defined as a confirmed practicing Catholic. That is why we require a reference form his/her parish priest that they meet the requirement-that they are attending Mass regularly. Although the maximum number of godparents is set at two, families could have additional people whose standing is that of 'witness to the baptism'. During the baptism, we don't distinguish between godparents and witnesses, but <u>only the names of the godparents will be inserted in the baptism register and in the baptism certificate.</u>

Equally, baptised Christians from other denominations may participate as witnesses to the baptism, but they cannot participate as godparents. Members of other faiths or none cannot serve as either godparents or as witnesses to the baptism.

Both parents and godparents, as part of the baptism, must make a declaration of faith. Prior to the baptism could we ask that you go through beforehand and ascertain you both can honestly make it? In all probability, if anyone has a problem with any part of it, the problem lies in understanding what is meant rather than with the article of faith itself-do contact me to discuss it well before the baptism. The unpleasant thing you could do is start your child's relationship with God by affirming in His presence to something you don't believe.

We don't charge for baptism but we ask families to make a contribution to defray the cost by given a donation in the range of £50-100, with others giving more.

Baptisms here at St Edmunds would take place on Saturday's at 11am or at any Mass.

The next Baptismal Course for parents who want to baptised the child will be on 27 February at 7pm on Zoom. If you are interested - start the process by emailing the office now.

The Small Seed of Christian Love

Pope Paul VI [said that] love is the core value that the world awaits from the Church today. If this is our focus, we will be able to say of each of our actions. 'this will remain'. It is a truth often mentioned but equally forgotten that what matters is not so much what we do or are capable of doing (even in apostolic endeavours) but how we do it. The more our actions are animated by love, the more fruitful they will be....So, if we Christians do not want to be behind the times, we must put love into everything we do. And we need to be especially vigilant that we are not lacking in love when life proves most difficult and painful.

Yes, everything passes: people, health, beauty, possession, God alone remains. Misfortune can mark the time for us to choose God anew as the one and all of our life, and thus to live the way he commands: to love. When you love you understand many things, and you will see how the golden thread of your life, apparently interrupted, continues to shine as brightly and even more so than before. In our lives we might experience all kinds of disruption, but the life of God is always alive, and so it is in those who have grafted themselves over and over onto him.
