FR ANDREW WRITES

This coming Thursday we celebrate the feast of the Conversion of St Paul and this day traditionally marks the end of the week of prayer for Christian Unity. The feast of the Conversion of St Paul marks his conversion from being a persecutor of Christians to being probably the most prolific and effective Christian missionary, spreading the Gospel message far and wide and bringing many people to faith in Jesus. But why should that feast in particular be associated with the desire for Christian unity?

The answer, I think, lies in what Christians really understand by 'conversion'. In Caravaggio's famous painting of the Conversion of St Paul on the Road to Damascus (reproduced on the front of newsletter this week), we see Paul thrown from his horse and lying upside down on the ground. The Acts of the Apostles makes no mention of a horse in fact, and it is probably Caravaggio who is responsible for fixing the idea in our minds that St Paul was in fact thrown from his horse. But the idea and Caravaggio's dramatic rendering of it gets to the point. St Paul didn't just sit down and weigh up the pros and cons of Christianity and decide that, on balance, it was probably a good thing. No! Paul's world really was turned upside down by an encounter with the risen Christ. Before this encounter with Jesus, who makes it personal by asking Paul why he is persecuting *Him*, Paul was in the driving seat or the saddle if you like, holding the reins, in control. Afterwards Paul is on his back, thrown from the saddle, no longer in control. That is what conversion is about, it's a total change of position where we allow Jesus to take centre stage, to take the reins. And this isn't a one off, it's a continuing way of life and often involves a series of jolts and challenges to our attempts to seize back control, to take the reins again and get back in the driving seat.

And here's the point, it is precisely when we as Christians try to put ourselves in the centre, in the driving seat or the saddle, when we try to hold on to the reins of power that we end up divided. It is only by putting Christ at the centre, allowing ourselves to be unseated, or in other words undergoing a constant conversion, that we come to see one another for what we truly are, fellow brothers and sisters of Jesus Christ, fellow sons and daughters of God our Father. It is through this road of conversion that we discover and are constantly reminded of our common humanity and this is the ground of Christian unity and of unity and peace among all peoples.

MASS THIS SUNDAY - The 3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B

First reading

Jonah 3:1-5,10

The word of the Lord was addressed to Jonah: 'Up!' he said 'Go to Nineveh, the great city, and preach to them as I told you to.' Jonah set out and went to Nineveh in obedience to the word of the Lord. Now Nineveh was a city great beyond compare: it took three days to cross it. Jonah went on into the city, making a day's journey. He preached in these words, 'Only forty days more and Nineveh is going to be destroyed.' And the people of Nineveh believed in God; they proclaimed a fast and put on sackcloth, from the greatest to the least.

God saw their efforts to renounce their evil behaviour. And God relented: he did not inflict on them the disaster which he had threatened.
