

#### FR ANDREW WRITES

It seems no time at all that we were all struggling to keep our new year's resolutions, whether it was dry January or doing a bit more exercise or something else. And now Lent is upon us and this coming Wednesday is Ash Wednesday. I think that sometimes people look at Lent as though it is just a religious version of new year's resolutions. Well, really, that is to miss the point.

Lent is not about self-improvement in that way; in fact, crucially, Lent is not about the self at all. In fact, Lent is the very opposite. Lent is about re-orienting ourselves outward towards God and our neighbour. And we begin this journey or process with a very stark and powerful symbol: by having ashes placed on our foreheads and hearing the words: "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return." To put on ashes is an ancient sign of repentance. In the ancient world, someone who had wronged the community in which they lived and who wanted to be forgiven would put on sackcloth and ashes as a sign of a newfound humility and a desire to change and to be forgiven. So this is how we enter Lent, humbly admitting to God and to one another that we don't always get it right. And those words "remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return" remind us of the most fundamental ways that we get it wrong or sin. At the heart of all sin is a turning in on the self in a kind of delusion that we are the only person in the world, that the world revolves around us, and that it will go on like that forever because there will never really be any consequences of our selfishness. To be reminded that God made us from the dust of the earth is to realise that we were formed by God, as part of creation, interconnected with it and especially with our fellow human beings. To be reminded that we shall return to dust helps us to see that our life on this earth from which we were created has real meaning precisely because it has an end. If life just went on and on like some interminable soap opera it would be pointless. Our life has meaning because there are real consequences of how we live, there are consequences for those around us now and also eternal consequences for us. And at the end of this life our bodies will die, they will return to dust, but our souls will live on. It won't matter then if we achieved the beauty of the body in this life (even we did that by giving up chocolate for Lent), it won't matter if we clothed ourselves in all the best gear, or surrounded ourselves with the trappings of status. What will matter is how much we recognised our need of God, hungered for Him and His goodness and how much we loved those around us. And that is why in Lent we are given three specific things. We are encouraged to open ourselves to God in praver, to increase our hunger and desire for him through fasting and to open our hearts to one another by giving alms. In this way Lent becomes a season of grace which is all about opening ourselves out towards God and our neighbour, waking up from our spiritual hibernation so that we are ready for the new life of Easter.

#### MASS THIS SUNDAY - The 6th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B

#### **First reading**

Leviticus 13:1-2,44-46

The Lord said to Moses and Aaron, 'If a swelling or scab or shiny spot appears on a man's skin, a case of leprosy of the skin is to be suspected. The man must be taken to Aaron, the priest, or to one of the priests who are his sons.

'The man is leprous: he is unclean. The priest must declare him unclean; he is suffering from leprosy of the head. A man infected with leprosy must wear his clothing torn and his hair disordered; he must shield his upper lip and cry, "Unclean, unclean." As long as the disease lasts he must be unclean; and therefore he must live apart: he must live outside the camp.'

**<u>Response to the Psalm</u>** You are my refuge, O Lord; you fill me with the joy of salvation.

## Second reading 1 Corinthians 10:31-11:1

Whatever you eat, whatever you drink, whatever you do at all, do it for the glory of God. Never do anything offensive to anyone – to Jews or Greeks or to the Church of God; just as I try to be helpful to everyone at all times, not anxious for my own advantage but for the advantage of everybody else, so that they may be saved. Take me for your model, as I take Christ.

<u>Gospel Acclamation</u> Ep1:17,18 Alleluia, alleluia! May the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ enlighten the eyes of our mind, so that we can see what hope his call holds for us. Alleluia!

## Gospel Mark 1:40-45

A leper came to Jesus and pleaded on his knees: 'If you want to' he said 'you can cure me.' Feeling sorry for him, Jesus stretched out his hand and touched him. 'Of course I want to!' he said. 'Be cured!' And the leprosy left him at once and he was cured. Jesus immediately sent him away and sternly ordered him, 'Mind you say nothing to anyone, but go and show yourself to the priest, and make the offering for your healing prescribed by Moses as evidence of your recovery.' The man went away, but then started talking about it freely and telling the story everywhere, so that Jesus could no longer go openly into any town, but had to stay outside in places where nobody lived. Even so, people from all around would come to him.
