**The Church will be open for private prayer** for one hour after the morning weekday masses (9:45am-10:45am, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday and for Exposition from 5:30pm on Saturday (on the presumption there are sufficient volunteer stewards)

New Government restrictions The announcements this week do affect us in several ways. Weddings are to be limited to just 15 people and Baptisms outside Mass to 6 people (including the baby and the priest!). The Bishops Conference advice was to avoid baptisms in the mass, both because numbers attending mass must be limited (we have a capacity of 50 people inside Church although that may be reduced) and the time inside church must be kept to a minimum. This may need reconsidering. The much heralded NHS app is now active and a QR code is displayed in church for those who wish to use it to log in.

• use the hand sanitiser provided, on entering the church.

•wear a face covering, over nose and mouth, all the time whilst in Church

•Follow the one way system for entering and leaving the Church

• We continue to operate a 'track and trace' system, so if you wish to attend a weekend Mass, ensure you book in beforehand at

**Confirmation Preparation Team** Some of those who have previously been part of our confirmation preparation team I know are not able to do so for this rotation. **The Year of the Word** This special year of celebration of Holy Scripture has been extended. It began on the feast of St Jerome (30th September 2019) and will now continue until the Sunday of the Word of God (Sunday 24th January [3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time])

One interesting thing I saw this week was from someone experienced in working in disaster zones. She used the image of 'the wall', that moment that marathon runners feel when their glycogen levels are depleted and they feel fatigue and negativity and are tempted to give up. The writer noted that whenever she had worked in humanitarian relief, there came a time, about six months in, when she found a 'wall', a time of struggle and slump. It was therefore no surprise to her that people going through this current pandemic would now, six months in, feel like they were running out of steam. She also suggested ways of managing this, including:

- •knowing there is life on the other side: this time will pass and we can get through it;
- •don't try and force your way through the wall, but recognise it will play itself out with time;
  •go with it: don't take on too many challenging projects, focus on the little victories of getting the basics done;
- •treat yourself to some mental breaks: read a novel, go for a walk, appreciate beauty;

2020 has been a difficult year for all of us and a profoundly worrying time for many, especially those who have suffered through illness or the uncertainties of the economy. Lives and livelihoods have been under pressure. Clearly we should expect that these immediate pressures will continue for at least another six months and that there will be longer term after effects. However, we shall get through this. We must do what we can. There may be further restrictions. We may have to do things in unaccustomed ways. But there will be light after darkness. **Christmas has NOT been cancelled.** Elements we associate with Christmas may well not be as we have been used to, but the Nativity of Our Lord Jesus Christ will be celebrated. Indeed Christmas 2020 will be an essential reminder that the Word became Flesh in order to fully participate in our human lot, especially our suffering and hurts so that we may be delivered from them. October, the month of the Rosary and the month of Mission, November, the month of Saints and the Holy Souls will lead into Advent, the season of reflection and preparedness. This year we need to use these

opportunities especially well.
