#### PREPARE THE WAY OF THE LORD

One of the most striking openings of any piece of musical theatre is the beginning of 'Godspell', where in a darkened theatre before the curtain rises a lone voice sings 'Prepare ye the way of the Lord' a couple of times; then the orchestra and chorus join in, the lights go up, and the scantily clad figure of John the Baptist strides onto the stage, often by way of the audience. St Mark announces the 'beginning of the Good News about Jesus Christ the Son of God', but then immediately turns to the preparation necessary for that good news to be heard, through the ministry of John, who clears the way by 'proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins'; and because he looked the part, it was clear he meant business. John's ministry was brief but challenging: the good news has to be prepared for. The Old Testament was a long process of preparation for the coming of the Messiah, which is why we hear in Advent particularly from the prophet Isaiah. John was the last of the prophets, able to say that what they had all been waiting for was now here in their midst. Hence Simeon could say on meeting the infant Jesus: 'Now you can let your servant go in peace, because my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared for all the nations to see.' Great crowds responded to John as they would later to Jesus, but while Jesus was almost continually on the move, preaching and healing, John stayed put and people had to come to him, in order to repent and be baptised in the Jordan. John healed no one, as far as we know, and Jesus did not baptise, but he submitted to John's baptism in solidarity with us who he had come to save. John disappears from the scene once Jesus has made himself known, but his influence pervades the rest of the Gospel. Jesus' manner was very different, 'like a shepherd feeding his flock'; and that is what he will do for us, once we have prepared a 'way for the Lord' to come into our lives. (Fr. John McCabe SJ)
