Ascension Thursday

We are approaching the time of the year when change happens. The young adults leave for college or university; friends return to their homeland after some years here; people move out of our area because of their work or for a different environment. For the most part, either we know where they are going, or we look forward to their return at the end of the summer.

With Jesus, of course, it's different. No one knows when he will return. and yet we have a powerful sense that he is with us always. Mark's version of the story is to reassure his listeners, including us, that everything that was foretold is confirmed: the disciples continue to preach and to teach, signs, miracles, transformation of lives continue to happen. And there is more consolation in the first reading, from the Acts of the Apostles. There, just before he is "lifted up," Jesus tells the apostles they will receive the Holy Spirit and "you will be my witnesses not only in Jerusalem, but throughout Judea and Samaria, and indeed to the ends of the earth." He is sending them on their -- and our -- mission. Jesus ascends to his Father so that he can return to be with us in the Church. He returns to be our companion as well as our saviour, and he offers himself to us in the Eucharist. Just like those who return from college or university, hopefully changed for the better, so Jesus returns to us as the risen Lord who walks side by side, not with his disciples any more, but with all those who believe in him. Jesus speaks to each one of us today as the one person who has changed our lives for ever. Because of Jesus we are freed from sin. Because of Jesus we are given the promise of salvation. Because of Jesus we have a strong Catholic Community to help us. This community of the church remains important only when we accept the risen Jesus into our hearts and follow him wherever he leads us. He gives each one of us a calling, a vocation; a

strong desire to know his will for us and to carry it out. We may want to cling to the "old, familiar" Jesus of the gospels, but this is the mission we are given - not to cling but to embrace. We are being sent out into the world to care for the people Jesus would have embraced - the poor, the marginalised, those who are rejected by society, those who are weak or afflicted. True disciples know and love the Lord; true disciples listen to his voice; true disciples "go out, preaching everywhere, and the Lord works with us and confirms the word by the signs" and transformations and miracles he can work with us and through us today.
