#### First Sunday of Advent (A)

#### 1st December 2019



The starting gun for Christmas has been discharged and the Christmas trees are already lining Crown Road. Every year, the Advent season is seen as a battleground between the secular festivities and the spiritual preparation that should be undertaken. Obviously for nearly everyone the festivities take over, the spiritual insights of the season not taken up so it becomes a secular imperative to get to Christmas itself and have a rest afterwards. The two tracks, the spiritual and material are not necessarily in conflict and the spiritual can orientate the material in the right direction and use the material for a higher purpose.

There is an appealing logic to this spiritual preparation which may be glimpsed in the unfolding of the Sunday readings for Advent. The Church begins its liturgical year this Sunday and the Gospel invites is to reflect on our own faith, not in terms of spiritual thoughts but in earthly realities. This then opens each of us to the message of conversion from St John the Baptist over the second and third weeks, and finally to contemplate one of the scenes surrounding the birth of Jesus on the fourth and last Sunday of Advent.

This Sunday Jesus describes the final days of the world in apocalyptic terms but not simply as a scene of destruction but as a means to understand the bigger picture of our own lives today. The difference between the two sleeping in the one bed and the two working in the fields does not reside in the activity itself, being the same in both cases, but in some unspecified internal disposition. The basic difference might be described as between life lived indifferently and life lived intentionally.

Everyone has experienced coming to the end of the day and wondering to themselves as to what have I done today? The question is not one of content because the day has been full of semi-conscious activity, but rather of something vital missing. That missing element is what distinguishes the human from the animal kingdom. Animals are busy all day but with the tasks inculcated by instinct alone or maybe, with domestic pets, some repetitive training. The ability to recognise the reason for why we act the way we do, or why we undertake the activities that we do distinguishes us from animals. Since we are created with a non-material, spiritual, centre of our existence, to recognise the reason for doing something becomes essential for our well-being. The experience of being crushed by semi-conscious activity, as we all know all too well, is not good for the soul, nor for our long-term health.

The recent years have seen a much greater awareness of mental health problems but their many of their causes still remain obscure. Whatever the causes of such illness might be, this situation cannot be helped by living lives with no ground, purpose or community. When the problems of life appear they easily spin out of control and become insurmountable. The Christian experience such difficulties too but even with a buried faith is still able to clutch the straws of meaning.

The season of Advent then begins with reflecting on our daily lives to see if we have not somehow lost that unique human characteristic of acting with intention rather than simply by instinct. This reflection will set up a chain-reaction that will make us more receptive to being questioned by John the Baptist as to the direction of our life, and later to recognise the tender details surrounding the coming of Jesus Christ at Christmas. The conclusion of our spiritual journey will be a renewed appreciation of the forthcoming Feast's meaning.

This spiritual journey will inevitably inform our own material celebration of Christmas by providing the measure by which to conduct ourselves throughout the festivities. The feasting, present-giving and shared time together will have found its spiritual anchor.


A warm welcome to **Cynthia Souza** who joins the parish team as our administrator from December 2nd.

#### **Foodbank Advent**

As adverts on the TV gently remind us of Christmas some of us might give some thought to what we have planned for advent, but certainly by the time Christmas music is played in shops and restaurants most us know what our plans for the Christmas season will be.

A lot of these plans will revolve around food, right from advent calendars to supermarket turkey sandwiches. What we eat plays a big part in the celebrations. For those among us who rely on foodbanks, this can be extremely isolating. They cannot plan their meals effectively, or fantasise about a huge meal on December 25th. Many children will not get a small chocolate every day in December. Food poverty is an issue all year round, but at a time when children are not at school is particularly challenging to provide that extra

This year many people are doing a reverse advent calendar or 'Foodbank advent'. We are suggesting that as well as enjoying the traditional countdown

to Christmas, we make room in our celebrations for giving. Beginning on 27th November, we will suggest one item a day, for 25 days, ending on 21st December. Then, before Christmas, donate the 25 items you have collected to your local foodbank. The reason it starts earlier is to allow time for the food to be dropped off at your local foodbank in time for Christmas.

The items will be things that foodbanks have need of, but feel free to substitute if you know of a particular need for something different. We also suggest dropping off some actual advent calendars off at your local foodbank before the start of December, to allow children (and adults!) to be part of the joy of preparing for Christmas.
