TODAY'S MASS



Today is the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. Today is also called *Corpus Christi*, the Latin words for "the Body of Christ." The Gospel for today reminds us that the Eucharist is a memorial of Christ's sacrifice on the cross. We believe that Jesus is truly present body, soul and divinity in the elements of bread and wine. Each time we celebrate this

sacrament, we are taken to the foot of the Cross at Calvary as if we were truly there ourselves and prepare for the Kingdom of God.

First Reading: Exodus 24:3-8

The covenant is established between God and the people.

Second Reading: *Hebrews 9:11-15*

Christ is the mediator of the new covenant.

Gospel Reading: *Mark* 14:12-16,22-26

Jesus shares his Last Supper with his disciples.

A DAILY PRAYER TO SAINT JOSEPH

The Eucharist is the supreme proof of the love of Jesus. After this, there is nothing more but Heaven itself

The Sacrament of the Body and Blood of Christ, which we call the Eucharist, is not just one of the seven Sacraments. It is the supreme Christian Sacrament and it is presented as such in all the Gospels. Mark makes it clear that Jesus instituted this Sacrament during a Passover meal, which in turn reenacts the central Exodus event in the history of Israel. For Jesus, this Sacrament interprets his own dying and rising as the definitive Exodus—the supreme act of liberation from bondage—now intended for all people and for all time. This represents for us, therefore, the ultimate liberation from sin and death and therefore from the bondage of guilt and fear and despair.

In this profoundly symbolic action at the Last Supper, Jesus reveals to his disciples the meaning of his imminent death and resurrection. He will not be dying as a misguided idealist, who loses everything at the end and who is believed by some naïve persons to have been somehow victorious. Rather, he is one who freely gives his life for others and whose love leads directly to his resurrection, since God cannot ignore such generous and unselfish love.

It is important to take seriously the words of Jesus about the reality of his presence among us in the Eucharist. It is a mistake, however, to think that the profound symbolic meaning of this Sacrament is in any way incompatible with its reality as the very Body and Blood of the Lord. In fact, if the reality alone is emphasized, there is always the danger of a simplistic and magical understanding of this Sacrament.


When we truly appreciate the symbolic and universal meaning of the Eucharist, we will see it, not only as the supreme example of the love of Jesus, but also as a claim on all who receive it to make that unselfish love the central feature of their own lives. In other words, we must by all means reverence this Sacrament and receive it with great devotion, but it is even more important to live its meaning when we return to our working lives. Receiving the Body and Blood of the Lord and continuing to be self-centred and insensitive at home or at work is clearly a serious contradiction.

It is very difficult, of course, to be truly and consistently dedicated to unselfish service. When we receive the Eucharist with profound awareness of its true meaning we experience the reality of God's love for us and, as that experience deepens, we become ever more free to be the kind of loving presence in our world that Jesus calls us to be.

The importance of all this becomes clear when we realise that our participation in the victory of Jesus will ultimately depend on how well we have lived his message of love for God and concern for others. In other words, in the end it will be the quality of our loving that will be decisive and not just the frequency of our reception of the Eucharist. It is precisely that dedication to unselfishness in all we do that will enable us to join Jesus in his glorious resurrection. Honouring and receiving the Eucharist will surely help us to live in that way, but it is recognition of Jesus for who is truly is and our loving care and concern for others that will make the Eucharist victorious in our lives.

MASS TIMES: We are now keeping again our traditional Mass routine for both Sundays and weekdays. i.e. Saturday 6.15pm (Vigil) Sunday 8.30am, 9.45am, 11.15am, 5.30pm

They have obviously never watched anyone die from Covid as I have: what a terrible way to die".

NEW CHANGES TO OUR MASS TIMES & LITURGY

After 17th May the government rules for places of worship have slightly changed.

- ♦ The use of hand sanitisers will continue to be available for those entering churches and people are encouraged to use it.
- ♦ The wearing of face coverings, remains at least for now in place (apart from those who are exempt).
- ♦ Cleaning once a day for most surfaces people touch. Cleaning more often on a Sunday.

- ♦ Social distancing continues.
- Holy water stoups remain out of use.
- Track & trace remains in place.
- Congregational singing is still prohibited; small groups may sing. More guidance will be provided before 21st June.
- ♦ The Sign of Peace remains suspended.
- $\ensuremath{\blacklozenge}$ Holy Communion remains under one kind only.

AFTER 21st JUNE If all goes according to plan...

- We will reintroduce the second reading at Sunday Mass and relax any other recommendations in the guidance given to use.
- Confessions and Benediction will return on Saturday evening.
- ♦ The Church will be open daily.
- ♦ Altar Servers will be encouraged to return.
- Choirs & singing are dependant on the government guidance. Nothing is allowed at present except a few socially spaced cantors.
- The daily rosary and other devotions will be permitted again in church.

IF YOU KNOW SOMEONE WHO HAS NOT BEEN TO MASS FOR A LONG TIME WHY NOT GENTLY ENCOURAGE THEM TO RETURN. YOU MIGHT EVEN ACCOMPANY THEM TO MASS.

DID YOU TAKE COMMUNION TO SOMEONE AT HOME BEFORE THE LOCKDOWN? If so we are now allowed to visit people at home for the giving of Holy Communion, though only ONE visit per day. Please speak to Mgr Jeremy of Fr Julio if you'd like to resume visits. We can then share with you the new guidelines that are set by these visits.

ARE YOU NEW TO THE PARISH? Please do fill in a Parish Registration Form which you can find at the back of the church. You can return it in the presbytery letter box or by post. This is important for us to know who you are and help you when the occasion arises.

WHEN WILL THE PARISH CENTRE BE OPEN AGAIN? We are awaiting new guidelines after the proposed date of 21st June after which we will need to take risk assessments for each group. We anticipate it will remain largely closed until the beginning of September. Let's hope that by then we will be back to normal!

HAVE YOU HAD THE VACCINE? Please do think carefully about it as it protects you and also you infecting others. This is important for us as a community and now moving forward.

HOLY BAPTISM: As from 17th May we can recommence celebrating the Sacrament of Baptism in Church. We are currently working through the list

of families awaiting Holy Baptism for their children. Some now have dates in the diary. If you are still waiting for a date, please contact us. Parents should be trying to attending Mass here, as a matter of course, before requesting this important Sacrament for their children. Fr Julio is coordinating all baptism requests so please be in touch with him.

CONFIRMATION 2021 - Parents/Carers should have received an email last week with details of the revised Confirmation Dates with Bishop John Sherrington. Thank you for helping the Candidates remember to bring along the Parent/Carer Consent Form & their completed Letter to the Bishop to the next session on Monday 7th June at 7.30pm where the Candidates will be reflecting on Christian Values.

CHURCH LAMPS: These can be booked eack week in memory of someone. Just contact thje parish office.

THE PARISH OFFICE remains closed. If you wish to book a Mass and for a Mass Card, the best way to get one is to give us all the details, your offering and an SAE and we will post it back to you ASAP.

GIFT AID DETAILS: In order to gift aid your donations you need to be a UK tax payer, if you are one you can gift aid your donations at no extra cost to yourself, we would be able to claim 25% of your donations from HMRC. It is also important that we keep our donor records up to date as we do not want to cause anyone any trouble, if your circumstances have changed or you are no longer a tax payer please inform the Parish Office at your earliest convenience. If we claim on behalf of someone who is not paying taxes HMRC may ask that person to refund the amount claimed.

SUNDAY READINGS & PRAYERS

Collect

O God, who in this wonderful Sacrament have left us a memorial of your Passion, grant us, we pray, so to revere the sacred mysteries of your Body and Blood that we may always experience in ourselves the fruits of your redemption.

Who live and reign with God the Father in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.

First reading: Exodus 24:3-8

Moses went and told the people all the commands of the Lord and all the ordinances. In answer, all the people said with one voice, 'We will observe all the commands that the Lord has decreed.' Moses put all the commands of the Lord into writing, and early next morning he built an altar at the foot of the mountain, with twelve standing-stones for the twelve tribes of Israel. Then he directed certain young Israelites to offer holocausts and to immolate bullocks to the Lord as communion sacrifices. Half of the blood Moses took up and put into basins, the other half he cast on the altar. And taking the Book of the Covenant he read it to the listening people, and they said, 'We will observe all that the Lord has decreed; we will obey.' Then Moses took the blood and cast it towards the people. This' he said 'is the blood of the Covenant that the Lord has made with you, containing all these rules.'

Responsorial Psalm: Ps. 115:12-13,15-18

R/. The cup of salvation I will raise; I will call on the Lord's name.

- 1. How can I repay the Lord for his goodness to me? The cup of salvation I will raise; I will call on the Lord's name. R/.
- 2. O precious in the eyes of the Lord is the death of his faithful.
 Your servant, Lord, your servant am I; you have loosened my bonds. R/.
- 3. A thanksgiving sacrifice I make; I will call on the Lord's name. My vows to the Lord I will fulfil before all his people. R/.

Second reading: Hebrews 9:11-15

Now Christ has come, as the high priest of all the blessings which were to come. He has passed through the greater, the more perfect tent, which is better than the one made by men's hands because it is not of this created order; and he has entered the sanctuary once and for all, taking with him not the blood of goats and bull calves, but his own blood, having won an eternal redemption for us. The blood of goats and bulls and the ashes of a heifer are sprinkled on those who have incurred defilement and they restore the holiness of their outward lives;

how much more effectively the blood of Christ, who offered himself as the perfect sacrifice to God through the eternal Spirit, can purify our inner self from dead actions so that we do our service to the living God.

He brings a new covenant, as the mediator, only so that the people who were called to an eternal inheritance may actually receive what was promised: his death took place to cancel the sins that infringed the earlier covenant.

Gospel Acclamation: Jn 6:51

Alleluia, alleluia! I am the living bread which has come down from heaven, says the Lord. Anyone who eats this bread will live for ever.

Alleluia!

On the first day of Unleavened Bread, when the Passover lamb was sacrificed, his disciples said to Jesus, 'Where do you want us to go and make the preparations for you to eat the Passover?' So he sent two of his disciples, saying to them, 'Go into the city and you will meet a man carrying a pitcher of water. Follow him, and say to the owner of the house which he enters, "The Master says: Where is my dining room in which I can eat the Passover with my disciples?" He will show you a large upper room furnished with couches, all prepared. Make the preparations for us there,' The disciples set out and went to the city and found everything as he had told them, and prepared the Passover.

And as they were eating he took some bread, and when he had said the blessing he broke it and gave it to them. 'Take it,' he said 'this is my body.' Then he took a cup, and when he had returned thanks he gave it to them, and all drank from it, and he said to them, 'This is my blood, the blood of the covenant, which is to be poured out for many. I tell you solemnly, I shall not drink any more wine until the day I drink the new wine in the kingdom of God.'

After psalms had been sung they left for the Mount of Olives.
