November Dead List

On All Souls's Day 2 November we prayed for all the Faithful Departed in a special way. Nevertheless, during the whole month it is customary to offer many Masses and prayers for those souls undergoing final purification.

Envelopes are available for parishioners to write a list of those whom they would like to be remembered, together, if you wish, with an offering.

Please do not leave these envelopes in the church but hand them in at the presbytery, or to one of the priests. Once any money has been removed the envelopes are placed in a basket near the altar at least when Mass is celebrated.

Masses will be celebrated for those on the November Dead List especially during the month of November and over the coming year. The Mass intention will be announced as being for the Holy Souls.

A Plenary Indulgence, applicable only to the souls in Purgatory, is granted to any of the faithful who: on one of the days from 1-8 November devoutly visit a cemetery or simply pray mentally for the dead. A Partial Indulgence, applicable only to the souls in Purgatory, is granted to any of the faithful who:

-devoutly visit a cemetery, or who simply pray mentally for the dead;

-recite devoutly Lauds or Vespers of the Office of the Dead, or the invocation

"Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord ... "

Sick and Retired Priests' Fund

On Sunday 5th November there will be a retiring collection for the sick and retired priests of our diocese.

Most priests offer their resignation at 75, but many continue to serve in our schools, hospitals, hospices and parishes. Last year, the Diocese of Westminster provided care to 82 retired priests, at a cost of £850,000. Caring for our brother priests in their senior years, or at a time of illness, is a fundamental part of the mission of our diocese. By supporting the Sick & Retired Priests' Fund, you can help cover essential costs and give them peace of mind that in the event of an emergency, their needs will be met.

You can place donations in the basket labelled "Sick and Retired Priests' Fund" in the Narthex in front of the noticeboard. Donation envelopes can be found at the back of the church and left in the same basket. You can also donate online at www.rcdow.org.uk/donations - the envelopes and posters feature a QR Code that you can scan with a phone camera to give online. From Pope Francis

Part of the General Audience Wednesday 25th October in St Peter's Square. The Holy Father continued his catechesis about the passion for evangelisation: the apostolic zeal of the believer.

Today I will talk to you about two brothers, very famous in the east, to the point of being called "the apostles of the Slavs": Saints Cyril and Methodius. Born in Greece in the ninth century into an aristocratic family, they renounced a political career to devote themselves to monastic life. But their dream of a secluded existence was short-lived. They were sent as missionaries to Great Moravia, which at the time included various peoples, already partly evangelised, but among whom many pagan customs and traditions survived. Their prince asked for a teacher to explain the Christian faith in their language.

Cyril and Methodius' first task was therefore to study the culture of those peoples in depth. Always the same refrain: faith must be inculturated and the culture evangelised. Inculturation of faith, evangelisation of culture, always. Cyril asked if they have an alphabet; they told him they did not. He replied: "Who can write a speech on water?" Indeed, to proclaim the Gospel and to pray, one needed a proper, suitable, specific tool. So, he invented the Glagolitic alphabet. He translated the Bible and liturgical texts. People felt that the Christian faith was no longer 'foreign', but rather it became their faith, spoken in their mother tongue. Just think: two Greek monks giving an alphabet to the Slavs. It is this openness of heart that rooted the Gospel among them. Those two had no fear, they were courageous.

Looking at the witness of these two evangelisers, whom <u>Saint John Paul II</u> chose as co-patrons of Europe and on whom he wrote the Encyclical <u>Slavorum</u> <u>Apostoli</u>, let us look at three important aspects.

First of all, *unity*. The Greeks, the Pope, the Slavs: at that time, there was an undivided Christianity in Europe, which collaborated in order to evangelise.

A second important aspect is *inculturation*, of which I said something earlier: evangelising the culture and inculturation show that evangelisation and culture are closely connected. One cannot preach the Gospel in an abstract, distilled way, no: the Gospel must be inculturated and it is also an expression of culture.

A final aspect is *freedom*. Preaching requires freedom, but freedom always needs courage; a person is free to the extent that they are courageous and do not let themselves be shackled by many things that take away their freedom.

Brothers and sisters, let us ask Saints Cyril and Methodius, apostles of the Slavs, that we may be instruments of "freedom in charity" for others. To be creative, to be constant and to be humble, with prayer and with service.
