Letter from Langdon Street

My dear people

Every time we gather to celebrate Mass we invoke the name of the Holy Trinity, in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. The priest also greets us with words taken from St Paul's second letter to the Corinthians: The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all. The mystery of the Holy Trinity is the mystery of the Godhead, something to celebrate even if we cannot understand it.

We are introduced to the Holy Spirit at our baptism when we are baptised in the name of the Father, Son and Spirit. We continue to encounter it at mass. The majority of the ancient hymns of the Church conclude with praise of the Holy Trinity. One of our favourite hymns in honour of the Mother of God, the Hail Queen of heaven, concludes with this verse: "And while to Him who reigns above, In Godhead one, in persons three, the Source of life, of grace, of love, homage we pay on bended knee. Do thou bright Queen, star of the sea pray for thy children, pray for me."


We can try to understand the mystery of God by seeking him in the Holy Scriptures. Today we hear a passage from the Old Testament, the Book of Exodus, where Moses brings a message to the people of God as a God of "tenderness and compassion, slow to anger, rich in kindness and faithfulness." Moses would never have understood who God was until God revealed himself to him in the burning bush as the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. In the epistle today we hear St Paul passing on to us the qualities of God that he could only have heard about from God himself. In the Gospel we hear the words of God uttered by the Son of God, Jesus our Saviour.

Jesus reveals himself to us as the Word of God made flesh who has come down from heaven, sent by the Father, to tell us of his Father's plan and purpose for our world, a world damaged by sin but restored by God's grace. He reveals his Father to us as a God who loved the world so much that he sent his own beloved Son to put the world to rights. The work of the Father and the Son is completed by the work of the Holy Spirit. We are caught up into this mystery, as it wrapped around with the life of God the Father, through the Son Jesus and in unity with the Holy Spirit.

The Second Vatican Council tells us that the Liturgy is the source and summit of the Christian life. At the heart of the liturgical life of the Church is the Holy Mass, the Blessed Eucharist. We come to mass each Sunday not out of duty but to receive the strength we need to help us in our daily lives. It is through the mystery of the Holy Trinity that we pray to God the Father, through the Son and in the power of the Spirit. We are not making a series of theological statements. Rather we are immersing ourselves into the life of God himself.

I am away from the parish this weekend. Yesterday I celebrated the wedding of John Pennicott whose parents are members of our parish. John was also a parishioner until he moved to Zurich where the wedding took place. I am most grateful to Father Brian Reynolds and Canon Bernard Scholes for celebrating the masses in my absence.

FEAST OF CORPUS CHRISTI

Next Sunday we celebrate the Mystery of the Body and Blood of the Lord. This is a special celebration for us since we celebrate the feast as the titular feast of our parish. Having dedicated our neighbouring parish at Berkhamsted to the Sacred Heart he chose Corpus Christi as the title of our church and parish in Tring. The children who made their First Holy Communion here weeks ago will return to celebrate the 10.30 mass with us and take part in the Procession of the Blessed Sacrament at the end of mass. They will then go into the parish hall for their Communion Breakfast.

RESTORED LIVES

Last Sunday in his Pastoral Letter Canon Vincent Nichols wrote about the importance of married life and the need for us in the Church to give support to those who have entered or plan to enter the married state. Several organisations are now providing support, especially for those whose marriages have broken down. A number of Catholic parishes in the country and on the continent have joined a network of communities, Catholic and non Catholic, that are part of an organisation called Restored Lives. We know the Church in her teaching and vision for personal dignity has the right tools and skills among her members to help people successfully recover from the impact of divorce on their life and the lives of those around them. The Restored Lives course encapsulates these tools and skills and has now had over 2,000 people attend with some amazing stories arising. In the past we have advertised The Beginning Experience and the Association of Separated and Divorced Catholics. We now encourage people to learn about the Restored Lives group. Further information can be found on the website at www.restoredlives.org. The Diocese will be telling us more about this on a later occasion.
