Letter from Langdon Street

My dear people

Our Lord often talked about the Kingdom of Heaven as a meal, wedding breakfast or banquet. Today the Prophet Isaiah tells of the banquet on Mount Zion to celebrate the kingdom. The mountain is Zion, a symbol of the heavenly Jerusalem, a heavenly banquet, a feast of rich food and choice wines, juicy, rich food and pure, choice wines. This gives us a dazzling and reassuring image of a God of mercy, compassion and love who will wipe away the tears of those who are in mourning. Because of this God's people who had been covered by a veil of sadness are now reassured of salvation and joy in the eternal kingdom.

During the past few weeks our Sunday Epistle has come from St Paul's Letter to the Philippians and today he concludes by thanking them for their generosity. He reassures them that God will reward their generosity and support in spreading the Good News. Saint John Chrysostom who was one of the great Fathers of the Church who lived in the fourth century, wrote the following in a homily of the Epistle: "They were artisans and paupers. They had wives, reared children and owned houses. They had given these gifts freely from their small means. There was nothing absurd in praying that such people so situated should have sufficiency and plenty. He does not ask God to make them rich or affluent. He asks only that God may 'supply their every need' – so they will not be in want but will have what they need."

Today's Gospel describes another banquet, the wedding feast that a king has provided for his son. Many guests were invited but refused to attend, claiming they were busy doing other things. To be invited at all was a distinct honour. Failure to accept the invitation constituted a grave breach of courtesy. The absentees were punished and the invitation was opened to all, even sinners.


The Synod of Bishops has just ended its first week. Many of the speeches reflected some of the ideas that Pope Francis continues to speak about, especially the mercy of God reaching out to saints and sinners. The Church in history is a mixture of saints and sinners. We must always remember that the Church isn't just a house for saints, but also a hospital for sinners. One of the guests at the wedding feast just could not bother to be properly dressed. This is a reminder to us that entry into the wedding feast is not automatic. We have to earn it. These words don't conflict with God's desire that all should be saved. In His love for mankind Christ patiently searches even the byroads seeking the conversion of every single soul, going so far as to die on the cross so that the entrance to the heavenly banquet is opened. However, God in His infinite wisdom and love respects man's freedom: man is free to reject God's grace.

The ground rules for the Synod on the Family, as laid down by Pope Francis, allow not just debate but collegial decision-making. Francis is in listening mode – an attitude, he insists, that requires humility. At this stage, the road ahead is unclear. There seems to be a general consensus that the Church's teaching on marriage will not be changed but it may be presented in a new light. A number of bishops speak about changing the harsh language that has been used in Church documents which, far from affirming Christian marriage, has driven people away from the Church. Archbishop Tartaglia, who is Archbishop of Glasgow, gave a homily during the opening prayer service one day last week. He said: "When Catholics see couples who are patient, kind, never jealous or rude, they "behold the beauty and simplicity and strength of married love," but the Church also must learn to help and to heal those whose dreams for lifelong love have been shattered. We must have compassion for the pain and laceration of the human hearts caught up in separation, betrayal and divorce.

One feature of the Synod is a daily contribution by one of the married couples who are present at the Synod. Their testimonies have had a profound effect on the bishops. They have spoken about passing on the faith to children, the effects of family breakdown on the children, the need to support abandoned children. They have described the hurt and long term anger they have encountered in couples who are in their second marriage and thus excluded from the sacraments. If God is the ultimate forgiver and full of compassion, these couples should be forgiven for previous mistakes. They should not be constantly reminded of past relationships.

We must continue to pray to the Holy Spirit to guide Pope Francis and the Fathers of the Synod to help them in their deliberations.
