## *Letter from Langdon Street*

My dear people

The disagreements between Our Lord and the Jewish leaders continue in today's Gospel. He is asked "What is the greatest commandment in the Law?" They were not asking about the Ten Commandments which Moses received on Mount Sinai. They were more concerned about the 631 rules that made up Jewish Law, man-made laws drawn up by rabbis and lawyers. In his reply he did not mention one of them. Instead he quoted from the Book of Deuteronomy (Love of God) and the Book of Leviticus (Love of Neighbour). The passage we hear today from the Book of Exodus speaks harshly against those who stick strictly to the letter of the law and in doing so carry out of gross injustice. Our Lord's approach is that the contents of the law is teaching to be lived, rather than rules to be obeyed. Everything that is done by the Church has to be set on the foundation of this Law of Christ, love of Gods and love of neighbour. Our lives as individuals, as part of a family, as part of the family of the Church have this double commandment as the basis of everything we do as followers of Jesus and committed members of his Church.

The disagreements that have been made public in recent days following the closure of the Synod that took place in Rome highlight an important change of emphasis introduced by Pope Francis. He wanted the bishops to speak freely but with respect for each person's opinions. Some of the bishops found it difficult to cope with the new procedures. Instead of blindly following what they thought the pope wanted, they were being asked to speak their mind and they were assured that the pope would not take offence.

There is a story told about what Pope Francis did when he was a bishop in Argentina. He set off from his flat, not the archbishop's palace, and travelled on public transport, by train and by bus, to one of the shanty towns. After celebrating mass he spoke to many of the people living in dreadful conditions. One woman spoke about her son who no longer went to mass. He said to her: "But is he a good kid?" She replied: "Oh, yes, Father Jorge," and the cardinal archbishop, prince of the Church, dressed as an ordinary priest said: "that's what matters." This reminded me of a conversation I had with a French bishop in 1963 who had been expelled from China at the Communist takeover. Pope John XXII, now Saint John XXIII, called together all the exiled bishops from China to discuss the problem of the many bishops and priests who had severed links with Rome and joined the Catholic Patriotic Association. Pope John asked a simple question: "These bishops are they good priests?" and they replied "yes." Pope John said: "if they are good priests, that's all that matters."

Pope John and Pope Francis seem to be walking a similar path. The aim of Pope John was to open up the Church and not be guided by people he spoke of as prophets of doom. Pope Francis had demonstrated in his conversation with the mother in the slum – and which has characterised his ministry for the past three decades - that the care of individuals takes priority over doctrine, "realities are greater than ideas." At the close of the Synod it became clear that more than half of the Catholic Church's leaders voted for changes – in attitudes to gay and divorced people – in harmony with the approach of the new pope. But a minority of conservatives prevented the changes from receiving a two-thirds majority. A majority of thirty in a House of Commons debate would be considered a great victory. At the Synod, with its required two-thirds majority, the majority of thirty

was a defeat. However, these issues will be considered again after the bishops have spent the next ten months or so with their fellow bishops back home and each bishop with the priests and people of their diocese.

After Pope Francis was elected he quickly established an agenda to consider a number of urgent issues such as the reform of the curia, the Church's civil service, the reform of financial procedures including the Vatican Bank and the sex scandals that had bedeviled the Church for decades. He decided to convene a special synod to discuss a subject which directly touches everyone of his flock – the family. It confronted the issue of why large swathes of the faithful choose to ignore official church teaching on contraception, pre-marital sex, cohabitation, divorce and homosexuality. Cardinal Nichols has reflected on the synod in the pastoral letter which is included with this newsletter.
