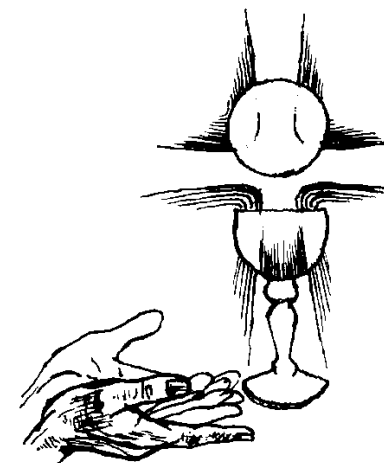

## *Letter from Langdon Street*

My dear people

The Gospel today tells us that in life we are sometimes offered a fundamental choice. We come to a crossroad where we have to choose one direction or another. This choice was originally offered by Joshua who succeeded Moses to lead the people of Israel into the Promised Land. Before crossing the river Jordan they had to choose between serving the Lord, the one God, or serving pagan gods. Our Lord offers us a share in a unique, loving and utterly faithful relationship with God that would last for eternity.

During the last few weeks we have listened to the words of Jesus in St John's Gospel about the mystery of the Eucharist. Today we come to the final passage where Our Lord explains the way we can receive life from him. The very thought of eating his flesh and drinking his blood was too much for some of the people listening to him. They walked away. He was not prepared to water down his teaching to curry favour and stop them walking away. He then asked the apostles what they were going to do. Were they going to walk away too? Peter spoke up for them all when he said: Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the message of eternal life."

There are moments in our life when we receive the grace of the sacraments. Some we receive only once, like baptism. The Holy Eucharist is meant to be received regularly. The first Christians received it every Sunday when they gathered together for what they called the breaking of bread, the Eucharist and the Sacred Mysteries and what we call the Mass. It was a tragedy for a Christian to fall from grace by sinning. They were expelled from the community which prevented them from receiving Holy Communion. They were excommunicated. It was only after doing penance that they were reconciled to the Church and restored to full communion with their fellow Christians. They could then receive Holy Communion once again.

We have for a long time understood that if anyone gets divorced and remarries, they are in a permanent state of excommunication which deprives them of the sacraments until they are approaching death. Last week Pope Francis suggested that such people should not be considered excommunicated. This has set the cat among the pigeons. Bishops and theologians are arguing among themselves about this. What do we mere mortals, priests and people in our local parishes, have to say about this? Will our voices be heard when the bishops meet with the pope at the Synod later this year?

Today's mass includes a passage from St Paul's letter to the Ephesians where he talks about our relationship with Christ and the Church, symbolised by the loving relationship between a husband and wife. Every Christian is called to integrity of life, to holiness. This is a message from the Second Vatican Council. A Polish priest, Maximilian Kolbe, who was martyred in Auschwitz Concentration Camp, travelled the world calling people to holiness. He said: "Today, holiness is a necessity, not a luxury." Most people achieve holiness within and *through* their marriage partnership. This idea might make some people nervous, because they have too austere an idea of holiness; consequently they find it hard to see how their marriage fits into it. For too long the idea of vocation has been restricted to people who have chosen celibacy in the priesthood and religious life. The vocation of marriage was the poor relation. The vocation to holiness and the choice of married life have been seen as two parallel lines which don't intersect. By contrast, St Paul saw the faithful living of family life as a basic

way to holiness. This is not some second-best option for those who have neither the talent nor the zeal for apostolic works. Our Church links holiness with lovingly embracing our role in this world. The married Christian's vocation is to show genuine love as husband, wife, mother or father. Of course, to exercise this love with integrity is not so easy. The statistics of marriage breakdown suggest how hard it is to sustain a permanent relationship. Nevertheless, the Church, which includes you and me, must continue to stress the ideal of marriage as a loving, life-long and life-giving relationship.

Most of us have met people of extraordinary courage who remained faithful despite the strain of marriage difficulties such as a partner's prolonged illness, or separation due to work commitments. The promise made in Christian marriage is the commitment to no longer being the sole master or mistress of our own destiny. The married Christian can no longer think merely in terms of "my life"—for everything is now related to another. This commitment is not one-sided but is mutually shared and mutually life-giving. At root of it all is the mystery of Christ's love, laying down our life for another. It is in and through this loving relationship, in the joy of giving and receiving love, that the married Christian is called to holiness.

Please remember Barbara Clark in your prayers. She is gravely ill. She and her husband Frank are devoted members of St Martha's Methodist Church and are active members of Churches Together. They always attend the monthly prayer breakfast and other inter-church events. In two weeks' time it will be our turn to act as hosts for the Prayer Breakfast.
