
Letter from Langdon Street

My dear people

The Synod of Bishops now enters its third week. Cardinal Nichols gave an important contribution to the discussions. He suggested that before the Synod could discuss the problems found in some marriages, we should devote our “first and consistently to the family not as a focus of problems but the first place in which the drama of the working of grace and nature is to be found.” He reminded the assembly of an old but important saying that “God is not bound by his sacraments” which he quoted from the Catechism. The Cardinal referred to the survey carried out in England and Wales where people spoke of the difficulties found in marriage but also spoke about the family as something that most people treasure most and care about passionately. He described how most families never withdraw a loving welcome home, even when dismayed by certain forms of behaviour. He said that we, the entire Church, must learn this pathway of “tough love”, a love that is compassionate, honest, and always seeking to find and nurture all that is good, as illuminated by the Gospel.

Married couples have also contributed to the discussions. A very moving contribution was made by Penelope Bajaj who has been married to a Hindu for thirty-nine years. She spoke about her experience of interreligious marriage as a couple, and in terms of faith and community, emphasising that the outcome of an interreligious marriage is mutual respect so that neither of the spouses feel obliged to renounce their faith. She said: “This religious freedom made the path of our marriage smooth and successful”. She also spoke about her experience as the mother of two children, who accompanied her to Church and attended Sunday school but were not baptised. “It was my husband's desire that both our children should be allowed the freedom of choosing their own religion and I accepted it with a very large lump in my throat”. She went on to explain that the differences of religion were never a deterrent to them and that little magic words like compromise, humility and sorry helped them to lose their ego and live for the other. She joked a little when she asked: “Is there someone out there who knows how a perfect marriage takes place?” She also remarked that she and her husband were still learning and understanding their marriage every day and that if it were not for her husband's tolerance and love of Christianity and her love and understanding of where he comes from, they would never have been able to celebrate their life and inter-community differences. She also said that she was deeply moved by the compassion and empathy of the Synod Fathers who understand the struggles of family life. She said that she saw their great love, concern and hope for families.

PREPARING FOR OUR JOURNEY TO BETHLEHEM

We are preparing for this year's Nativity Play. The Holy Family were displaced (having to go to Bethlehem to conform with Roman regulations) and later having to flee for their lives

(Herod's massacre) to become refugees in Egypt for several years. The world has not changed!

The Nativity Play will be part of our Christmas Eve Mass for families which will bring together the children who are part of SPOG, the Sunday Children's Liturgy Group and the First Communion Class. We hope other children will join in. We need to start planning for this as soon as possible.

HELP FOR REFUGEES

The bishops of England and Wales have asked their local Caritas group to co-ordinate efforts to help the refugees who are escaping persecution. Caritas Westminster has already received spontaneous offers of help. This is heartening to see the generosity of people's responses to the migrant crisis, and we in the Diocese of Westminster must work together to create communities where all migrants find a warm welcome. Meanwhile, with winter on the way, our thoughts turn to people in the Middle East who have been displaced from their homes and are living on the frontline of the Syrian civil war. There are communities of nuns who have stayed to look after these traumatised people, especially little children. If the death and destruction of war is an example of the worst of mankind; the work of people like the sisters is a shining example of the love and compassion mankind is capable of. Aid to the Church in Need, whom we have helped several times, continues to give support on our behalf.
