Letter from Langdon Street

My dear people

Today used to be called Low Sunday marking the end of the High Feast of Easter. It is the day when we have the important story of St Thomas (Doubting Thomas) who had refused to believe that Jesus had really risen from the death. In recent years it has also been known as Divine Mercy Sunday since St John Paul II encouraged the devotions of Mother Faustina when he canonised her in April 2000. Mother Faustina wanted to stress in mercy of God in our lives. During this Jubilee Year of Mercy Pope Francis is stressing the importance of God's mercy.

When Pope Francis became Archbishop of Buenos Aires he chose as his episcopal motto or mission statement: *Miserando atque Eligendo* which come from a homily written by one of England's greatest saints, St Bede the Venerable, who died in AD 735. St Bede was writing about the call of Matthew to be an apostle: Jesus, therefore, saw the publican, and because he saw by having mercy and by choosing, He said to him, "Follow me." Pope Francis adapted the word when he said; "mercy and choosing him" describes the vision of Jesus who gives the gift of mercy and chooses." Pope Francis is very conscious of being chosen to be pope. He will never tire of linking the mercy of God with the love of God.

Pope Francis wants us to understand that the Church must condemn sin, it must relay the truth: 'this is a sin'. But at the same time, it will embrace the sinner and speak to him of the infinite mercy of God. Jesus forgave even those who crucified and scorned him. On the cross he forgave the repentant thief, Dismas, and promised him a place in Paradise. In a recent homily he said: "To follow the way of the Lord, the Church is called on to dispense its mercy over all those who recognise themselves as sinners, who assume


responsibility for the evil they have committed, and who feel in need of forgiveness. The Church does not exist to condemn people, but to bring about an encounter with the visceral love of God's mercy."

He also says something that I consider very important: "I often say that in order for this to happen, it is necessary to go out: to go out from the churches and the parishes, to go outside and look for people where they live, where they suffer, and where they hope. I like to use the image of a field hospital to describe this "Church that goes forth". It exists where there is combat. It is not a solid structure with all the equipment where people go to receive treatment for both small and large infirmities. It is a mobile structure that offers first aid and immediate care, so that its soldiers do not die. It is a place for urgent care, not a place to see a specialist. I hope that the Jubilee [The Holy Year of Mercy] will serve to reveal the Church's deeply maternal and merciful side, a Church that goes forth toward those who are "wounded," who are in need of an attentive ear, understanding, forgiveness, and love."

A number of books have been written by or about Pope Francis and the latest is called "The name of God is mercy." It has just been announced that his long-awaited apostolic exhortation on the family will be published on April 8, and will be known by its Latin name, "Amoris Laetitia" ("The Joy of Love"), on love in the family.

I have just received an update from Westminster concerning my remuneration as parish priest. It includes the offering or stipend for mass intentions. When I was ordained in 1962 the mass stipend was five shillings (25 pence). Cardinal Heenan raised it to ten shillings (50 pence) and later to a pound, then two pounds and finally five pounds. It has remained unaltered since the 1970s. Last year it was raised to ten pounds but I did not announce this at the time. The recent notice about priestly remuneration is an appropriate time to publish the new list of stipends. It has always been at the discretion of a priest to receive a smaller stipend or no stipend at all. I will continue to accept five pounds from those who cannot afford the new stipend. I have never asked for a donation for baptisms but some families have generously given £50. I have therefore included this as the stole fee for future baptisms.

REMUNERATION FOR PRIESTS

The Offertory Collections at Christmas and Easter form an important element of the remuneration of the Priest/s of the parish. Priests do not get a salary as such, being 'office holders', but money given in the Offertory at Christmas and Easter, plus money given as Mass Offerings and Stole Fees (for Baptisms, Weddings and Funerals), makes up the income of Priests. The money received from these sources is banked in the parish account and then given to the Priest through the diocesan payroll in monthly instalments and the parish is debited for the amount paid out. Most Priests in active ministry of, and in, the Diocese avail of this service offered by the HR Department.

The revised Stole Fees for Tring Parish as from 5 April 2016 are:

Mass Intentions: £10

Baptisms: £50

Weddings £150 (plus office and curial expenses)

Funerals: £150

Walsingham is known as England's Nazareth. The theme of the pilgrimage is "Mary, the Mother of Mercy." The day will include an outdoor Mass, procession with the statue of Our Lady of Walsingham and banners along the Holy Mile, prayers and Benediction in the Priory grounds, and free time to visit the Basilica, the Slipper Chapel and the Holy Door. Bring a picnic lunch. The Cardinal is also asking priests to consider cancelling the Saturday evening mass on 9 July to enable them to travel with their parishioners.
