Letter from Langdon Street

My dear people

The word Advent means “coming.” Today is Gaudete Sunday. The word Gaudete means “rejoice.” Half way through Advent the Church puts aside purple vestments, symbolising repentance and puts on rose coloured vestment, symbolising joy. As we draw ever closer to Christmas, today’s readings teach us that waiting has its own special value. For this we rejoice.

Advent is a time for waiting, a time of expectation. We are a people waiting for the Messiah to arrive in our lives and in the world. His first arrival, when he was born in a stable, is commemorated at Christmas. There is also his second arrival, when he will come as King and Judge on the Last day, may be anticipated. There is also his daily coming into our lives, in prayer, in the people we meet and in the activities we do.


Waiting is part of our lives. A priest I know used to work at Westminster Cathedral. He spent a lot of time just walking around the Cathedral waiting in case somebody wanted to speak to him about a problem. He called it loitering with intent. It required a lot of patience to do this. Impatience can lead to frustration, anxiety, anger, cynicism and, ultimately, unhappiness. Unhappiness prevents us from doing anything constructive to sustain and prepare us while we wait. Our waiting is in vain and, inevitably, we are not ready when the time finally comes. He never saw his loitering with intent as a waste of time.

Last week we heard the message of John the Baptist calling people to repentance when they came to him to be baptised in the River Jordan. Today we hear his message from prison. He had heard reports of Jesus beginning his ministry and was a bit confused. Jesus was not doing what he expected him to do so he sent his disciples to ask Jesus: ‘Are you the one who is to come, or have we got to wait for somebody else?’ John was the last in a long line of prophets who had been waiting for generations for the Messiah to come. Jesus replied: “Go back and tell John what you hear and see; the blind see again, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised to life and the Good News is proclaimed to the poor.”

The message of Advent, then, is that we should wait patiently for the Lord to come into our lives. We hear today how the Jewish people in exile in Babylon experience the harshness of God's anger for their faithlessness. Yet the prophecy of Isaiah came to bring them hope. "God will come and save you." In the pain of exile Isaiah gave them, and us, the vision of what this joy and hope will look like: "The eyes of the blind shall be opened, the ears of the deaf unstopped," conveying the same message of Our Lord in the Gospel. St James in today's epistle tells us about the farmer who waits patiently for the harvest to come. He has worked hard to sow the seed and had to be patient to see it bear fruit at harvest time. Our waiting can be a time of enrichment during which some positive change can occur. Our Lord speaks highly of John: "I tell you solemnly, of all the children born of women, a greater than John the Baptist has never been seen."

John the Baptist was a man of passionate commitment to what he believed in. He strongly believed in the coming of the Christ. This man of faith was tested when Our Lord turned out to be a different type of Christ or Messiah from what he expected. He was a man with a lot of conviction and truth. He preached what he believed. He practised what he taught. Pope Francis has turned out to be a different type of pope from his predecessors. He told us recently that there is no prayer in which Jesus does not inspire us to do something. He said that our faith in Jesus is seen in strong action. The poor are helped by pre-Christmas collections. Here at Corpus Christi over fifty children who have a parent in prison will receive a present from members of our parish. We are not asking what we might get for Christmas, but how our Christmas might help others. While preparing to make this a happy time for our own families and close friends, we must reach out to those in need so that everyone know the truth of God's coming into the world.
