

Fish for supper

In our gospel passage this Sunday, the disciples told their story of what happened on the road to Emmaus, and how they had recognised Jesus at the breaking of bread when Jesus stood among them and said to them, 'Peace be with you!'. They were alarmed and frightened because they thought they were seeing a ghost. But he said 'Why are you so agitaed and full of doubts?' Look at my hands and feet; yes it is I indeed. Touch me and see for yourselves; a ghost has no flesh and bones as you can see I have. 'And as he said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. Their joy was so great that they could not believe it, and they stood dumbfounded; so, he said to them. 'Have you anything here to eat?' and they offered him a piece of grilled fish, which he took and ate before their eyes.

Indeed, the two disciples had met Jesus on their way to Emmaus. There Jesus had used the Eucharistic meal to reveal himself to them, for the Eucharist is always an occasion for us to get to know the Risen Christ better. Now he meets the whole group of disciples in their refuge, the Upper Room. It is perhaps an account of the same incident we heard last Sunday, but with a different emphasis. Now the stress is on the meeting with a real person, and not with a ghost. That is why Jesus eats a piece of fish. The important lesson of this is that, in our resurrection to true life, it is the whole person that is raised, not just the soul. Christian teaching is that a person is an animated body. We work out our salvation with fingers and toes and other bodily members, and all will be raised to new life. It is not just a matter of thoughts and intentions! The whole body is baptised into Christ and is the instrument of our salvation. The body will be changed, and St Paul reminds us, that we should not get bogged down with worrying about what sort of body we will have at the resurrection but rejoice that each of us will be raised as a whole person.

What do you imagine the risen life to be like? Is love, friendship and companionship part of this?
