Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 51:3-4,12-13,14-15A prayer for God's mercy and forgiveness

Second Reading: Hebrews 5:7-9

Through his sufferings, Jesus gained salvation for all who obey him.

Gospel Reading: John 12:20-33

Jesus teaches his disciples about the way in which he will be glorified by God, and a voice

from heaven is heard to affirm this teaching.

As we continue our Lenten journey with Christ, the human face of God, today's readings remind us of the painful struggle Jesus had to endure to be faithful to his vocation as suffering Messiah. As we saw on the first Sunday in Lent in the story of the temptations, Jesus had to decide how he would fulfil his messianic vocation. From the beginning of his ministry he chose the path of suffering love, the way of the Cross. Both the second reading from the Letter to the Hebrews and the Gospel give us an insight into what this would cost him.

The gospel reveals Jesus' inner struggle as the time of his passion and death draws near We have here an echo of Jesus' agony in the Garden of Gethsemane where he seemed appalled at the prospect of his forthcoming death and prays to his Father: 'Take this cup away from me'. Jesus' fear reveals his humanity. Fear is natural. Jesus' trepidation is followed immediately by his humble submission to the Father's will. Jesus knows that his death is necessary and he embraces it freely, the climax of his life giving mission: 'Unless the grain of wheat falls on the ground and dies, it remains a

single grain, but if it dies it bears much fruit.' It is indeed a paradox and a deeply counter-cultural one. But it expresses a profound truth at the heart of life and a key principle of all Christian discipleship. To try to avoid death, including the 'little deaths' that are part of everyday living, is to stunt our growth in love and suffocate the Spirit. From the moment we are born until the moment of our physical death, we experience many 'deaths', beginning with our departure from the comfort and warmth of our mother's womb. Our lives are inscribed with a series of 'deaths', losses and renunciations - in our relationships, in our career goals, in our hopes and expectations. An it is from these 'little deaths' that we learn to change, to adapt and make new gains.

Jesus' challenge to us is clear. It is to die to self and imitate his own life-giving service: 'The one who serves me must follow me. Wherever I am, my servant will be there too.' To follow Christ is to choose to walk with him through 'thick and thin', in good times and bad. It is to travel with him all the way to the Cross. And this way, as Pope Francis reminds us, is the way of

de-entering and transcending. 'We have to leave behind the "selfie" culture and look at the eyes, faces, hands and needs of those around us; and in this way find, too, our own faces, our own hands, full of possibilities.'

'A Grain of Wheat must Die': Flor McCarthy Each of us is like a grain of wheat planted by God.

Just as the grain of wheat must die to produce a harvest,

so we must die to self in order to bear the fruits of love.

This dying to self is a gradual process and happens in little ways.

Every act of humility involves dying to pride. Every act of courage involves dying to cowardice.

Every act of kindness involves dying to cruelty.

Every act of love involves dying to selfishness.

Thus the false self dies, and the true self, made in God's image, is born and nurtured. It is by giving that we receive; It is by forgiving that we are forgiven;

It is by dying that we are born to eternal life.

St. Joseph, Spouse Of The Blessed Virgin Mary - Feast day 19th March

A few verses in Matthew and Luke tell us all we know about St. Joseph. They provide just enough information to demonstrate why he was the divine choice to become the husband of Mary and the foster father of Jesus. Joseph was genealogically perfect for these roles. A distant descendant of King David, he gave Christ the King his royal lineage. Joseph also came from the right hometown. He was from Bethlehem, the city that Scripture predicted would produce the messiah. And as a carpenter, Joseph was poor - Christ's condition of preference. Scripture portrays Joseph as open to God, obedient, upright, and, above all, kind. The saint displayed all of these qualities in his handling of Mary's surprise pregnancy. Imagine the confusion of emotions that must have flooded him when Mary confided that she was going to have a baby by the Holy Spirit! As a devout observer of the law, Joseph knew that he might have to repudiate his betrothal. But his kindness and confidence in Mary prevented his taking such a harsh step, which would have shamed her. Joseph's wise dealing with Mary is a model for us when we face complex moral and personal issues. He subordinated his feelings to do what God required. He was open to whatever God wanted, and when he sensed the divine will, he obeyed.
