First Reading: Acts of the Apostles 9:26-31
Paul is accepted by the apostles at Jerusalem.
Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 22:26-27,28,30,31-32

The whole world shall praise the Lord. **Second Reading: 1 John 3:18-24**

God commands us to believe in Jesus Christ and to love one another.

Gospel Reading: John 15:1-8

Jesus teaches that he is the vine and that his disciples are the branches.

Today's reading from the Gospel of John is part of Jesus' discourse at the Last Supper. Recall that John tells the story of Jesus' Last Supper differently from the other Evangelists. In John's Gospel, the Last Supper begins with Jesus washing his disciples' feet. Jesus then provides them with a series of instructions. We call this section the Last Supper discourse or Jesus' farewell discourse. In these chapters of John's Gospel, Jesus instructs his disciples about the importance of following his example of love and service, about the gift they will receive when Jesus sends them the Holy Spirit, and about their relationship with Jesus and with the world. The Last Supper discourse concludes with Jesus' prayer for his disciples.

Today's Gospel reading is taken from middle of the Last Supper discourse. Jesus speaks about his relationship to his disciples. In his metaphor of the vine and the branches, Jesus is referencing the Hebrew Scriptures. In the Hebrew Scriptures, Israel is the vineyard, and Yahweh himself tends the vineyard. One of the primary themes of John's Gospel is to show Jesus to be the fulfilment of God's promises to Israel.

In this passage, Jesus teaches his disciples that his relationship with them will not end after his death; he will remain with them always. This unity between Jesus and his disciples is the basis for their ability to continue to do the work that he began. Similarly, Jesus' presence with us through the Gift of the Holy Spirit enables us to continue the work of love and reconciliation that he began. Jesus also teaches his disciples about the importance of the words he has taught to them. Just as Jesus will remain in the disciples, so too will his words. We come to know Jesus through the Scriptures, the living Word of God. Our commitment to be Christ's disciples is sustained through God's Word. This commitment is also strengthened by our life of prayer and nourished by the Eucharist. Through the Eucharist, Jesus dwells in us, remains with us, and transforms us so that we might bear fruit in his name.

We observe many people who act in ways that show their commitment to serve their neighbour. Christians and non-Christians feed the hungry, care for the sick, shelter the homeless, and give alms to the poor.

PRAYER

"Lord Jesus, thank you for inviting us into a close relationship, a deep friendship with you. Help us to realize that only you can fulfill our deepest needs. May we express our gratitude to you by the way we reach out to all others, especially those in greatest need of our help and compassion. Amen".

These actions become acts of Christian discipleship when they are motivated by our relationship with Jesus. Whatever the immediate results, Jesus promises us that these actions will bear fruit when we undertake them in his name. Today's gospel is also about relationships, communion and friendship. Jesus is telling us that we will not have the deep joy and peace we seek unless we are in a deep personal relationship with him and his Father. We will not be true disciples of Jesus if we remain far from him and don't have his value system. Sadly, many Christians think that their religion is about keeping the commandments and if they do more good than bad in life they will go to heaven. For sure we have commandments and laws to guide us but ultimately Christianity is a Person - Jesus Christ and our relationship with him.

Then the commandments will take their proper place. I can go to Mass on Sunday, say some prayers and do some good works which are very good actions. But I can miss out on the essential fact of Christianity, my relationship to Jesus, the Father, the Spirit and to my fellow human beings. Laws in themselves don't give life.

Feast of the English Martyrs - Feast day 4th May

The feast of the English Martyrs is celebrated on May 4th. The 40 martyrs canonised under Paul VI in 1973, previously celebrated on October 25, are celebrated with the 85 beatified Martyrs of the Reformation and the other martyrs of the 16th and 17th century. The feast coincides with the Church of England celebration of English saints and martyrs of the Reformation era. These are a significant group of saints in British Catholicism and include St Margaret Clitherow, the butcher's wife from York who became a Catholic at the age of 18 and was arrested for harbouring a priest. She was crushed to death under a large door loaded with weights. St John Haughton, St Robert Lawrence, St Augustine Webster, and St Richard Reynolds were Carthusian monks executed at Tyburn on May 4 1535. St Cuthbert Mayne, another martyr, was a young man from Devon who went to St John's College, Oxford, in the late 1500s, where he met St Edmund Campion and eventually became a Catholic. Fearing arrest after a letter from Gregory Martin addressed to him ended up in the hands of the Bishop of London, Cuthbert fled to Cornwall. From here he fled to the English College at Douai and was ordained a priest. He returned to the English mission and was discovered, tried at Launceston and sentenced to be hanged, drawn and quartered. Because of the coincidence of dates with the C of E commemoration of the English saints and martyrs of the Reformation era this feast has all the makings of an ecumenical celebration, and is thus an eminently important occasion for the Ordinariate.

Gerry, and his amazing list of contacts, has addressed many issues such as trees, potholes, protection of grass verges, and re-furbishing the statue of Our Lady in the parish garden, to name but a few. Church Roof and boiler updates

Engineers were on site this week and have fitted the new boiler for the church. This boiler is more energy efficient (helping our parish to be greener) and cheaper to operate. The cost is £22,000 and we are so grateful for the donations which now amount to £10,000! The remainder of the cost will be met by the parish budget.

Work on totally recovering the church roof with a waterproof product (with a 30 year warranty) should take place in July / August. These works will cost £125,000. Our plan is to part fund this work from the parish budget and to seek a loan through the diocese for £75,000, to be repaid over three years. The quicker we re-pay the loan, the less interest and fees we pay. In next week's newsletter we will explain how the parish finance team plan to repay the loan - with your help of course!

Pilgrimages


The Divine Mercy Pilgrimage to Walsingham will take place on Saturday 1st June 2024. Please see the posters at the back of the church.
